WHAM Nightshelter Feedback



ix churches in Macclesfield hosted the WHAM (Winter HOPE Accommodation Macclesfield) winter weekend shelter over fourteen weekends this winter (2015-16). Participating churches were Elim Pentecostal, Macclesfield Methodists, Salvation Army, St Alban's, St Michael's and the United Reformed Church. The period covered each weekend was from 18th December 2015 through to 21st March 2016.

St Michael's hosted three weekends: January 1st, March 4th and March 17th. A total of 36 volunteers were involved in covering the 90 shifts required. Most of these (30) were members of St Michael's and our other Team Ministry churches. Both 9.30 and 11.00 congregations from St Michael's were well represented and it was a good opportunity to get to know each other. Many of the St Michael's volunteers also did shifts at other churches.

St Michael's hosted probably the coldest and most busy weekends with one night having as many as eight guests.

Some of the meals were provided by our Girlguiding Senior Section (girls aged 14-18) which gave them the opportunity to discover more about the work of the church to which they are associated and do a 'service' project and practise cooking skills.

The overall picture

Twenty two different males guests were given at least one night's shelter and 104 nights' accommodation were provided in total over the 2015-16 period. Guests, on average, stayed for two nights over a weekend.

Guests really valued the 'safety and security' of the shelter and 'being able to talk with people'.

Other faith led organisations that supported the shelter include Silklife Foodbank, Treehouse who provided the meal on Saturday night and clothing as well as Just Drop In, HOPE NEC and others.

There have been good relationships and support from local police and the Council Housing Options Team and excellent advocacy from the Citizen's Advice Bureau.

WHAM continues to be an example of Macclesfield Churches working together to help with a problem which symbolises the broken makeup of much of our society.

We hope to be able to run the shelter again this coming winter. If you would like to get involved this year or have been inspired to take part having read this feedback, please e-mail Rachel Mayers at rachel.mayers@btinternet.com


Archbishop's Call to Prayer

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are inviting churches to pray for the evangelisation of the nation - a great wave of prayer, during the week before Pentecost Sunday. St Michael's responded with a prayer meeting in its Savage Chapel at 3pm on Pentecost Sunday. Revd Marion Tugwood, URC Minister, Revd Dave Mock and Revd David Wightman from the Team churches and Chris Whitely, former minister from Bethel Baptist Church joined forces to deliver a prayer session encouraging us to be confident to evangelise the transforming power of a relationship with God.

In their letter the Archbishops said: "At the heart of our prayers will be words that Jesus himself taught us – 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done.' It is impossible to overstate the lifetransforming power of the Lord's Prayer. It is a prayer that is reassuring enough to be on the lips of the dying and yet dangerous enough to be banned in cinemas. It is famous enough to be spoken each day by billions in hundreds of languages and yet intimate enough to draw us ever closer into friendship with Jesus

Christ. It is simple enough to be memorised by small children and yet profound enough to sustain a whole lifetime of prayer. When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the new ways in which God can use us to his glory."

The Servant Queen

Our most observant readers will have noticed that this year marks the 90th birthday of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Queens are lucky as they have two birthdays. Her real birthday is on the 21st April and her official birthday which moves from year to year is on a Saturday in June (June 11th this year) – the idea being to get better weather for the parades etc. Obviously the person who thought of this didn't understand British weather.

One aspect of our Town Centre Ministry at St Michael's is to foster relationships between the Church and the Town in a number of ways. One of these is to host (most years) the Mayor's Civic Service and - since the formation of the Town Council – the Thanksgiving Service for the Mayor's year of office at which the Town recognises the many volunteers from all walks of life who make Macclesfield a better place. We also hold each year the Town Carol service for people who live and work in the town.

This year on the Sunday closest to the Queen's birthday we held a short tree planting ceremony in the Churchyard at which the first of 90 trees which the Town Council are going to plant in commemoration during the year, was planted by the Mayor Cllr Liz Durham. Prayers for the Queen were said at this ceremony. When we celebrate the people in this town - many of whom are worshippers at one of the town's churches - who give of themselves in serving others, we do indeed in a sense celebrate the Queen - the servant Queen and we celebrate the Lord she serves – the servant Lord.

The Bible Society and HOPE have produced a booklet - which we gave away at the planting - which shows how the Queen's life of service is founded on her faith and her ideal of faith driven service. In her Christmas message in 2002 she said "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I



know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God... I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel.

Genocide - murder of a race of people



Genocide is one of the most heinous sins that mankind can perpetrate—the systematic slaughter of a group of people because of their ethnicity, their religion or their politics. In short: because they are different. Genocide is still taking place in the world today and there have been many other instances, such as Rwanda, in the past 100 years. This article looks at three genocides which have taken place in the last 100 years—not to say they are better or worse than others but because this year marks their significant anniversary. The week commencing 11th July has been earmarked to commemorate them.

Remembering Srebrenica

This year marks 21 years since the Srebrenica genocide, the single greatest atrocity in Europe since the Second World War. It remains a brutal reminder of man's inhumanity to man. In July 1995, more than 8,000 Bosnian Muslim men and boys were systematically murdered because others hated them for who they were. The youngest victim of the genocide was just two days old—shot in the head. The child would have turned 21 this year.

"The name of Srebenica now stands for one of the darkest chapters of European history... Some dared to believe, after Aushwitz and Birkenau, that such horrors were consigned to history and could never happen again in our modern world. But they did. So we must learn and act on the lessons of Srebenica, on the need to act in the face of evil". David Cameron, Prime Minister

Remembering Medz Yeghern

The Armenian Genocide, also known as the Armenian Holocaust, the Armenian Massacres and, traditionally by Armenians, as Medz Yeghern, was the Ottoman government's systematic extermination of its minority Armenian subjects inside their historic homeland, which lies within the present-day Republic of Turkey. The number of victims is estimated at between 800,000 and 1.5 million. On 24 April 1915, the Ottoman authorities rounded up, arrested, and deported some 250 Armenian intellectuals and community leaders from Constantinople to Ankara, the majority of whom were eventually murdered. The genocide was carried out during and after World War I and implemented in two phases: the wholesale killing of the able-bodied male population through massacre and subjection of army conscripts to forced labour, followed by the deportation of women, children, the elderly and infirm on death marches leading to the Syrian desert. Driven forward by military escorts, the deportees were deprived of food and water and subjected to periodic robbery, rape, and massacre. The Armenian genocide was not recognised as such until 1985 due to the West's desire not to alienate the Turkish government.

Remembering The Holocaust

This year marks the 76th anniversary since the Jewish Holocaust, the systematic, bureaucratic, statesponsored persecution and murder of six million Jews by the Nazi regime and its collaborators. The Nazis, who came to power in Germany in January 1933, believed that Germans were "racially superior" and that the Jews, deemed "inferior," were an alien threat to the so-called German racial community. During the Second World War the Nazis sought to murder the entire Jewish population of Europe and to destroy its culture. In 1941 there were about 11 million Jews living in Europe; by May 1945 the Nazis had murdered six million of them. Oneand-a-half million of these were children.



Friends of St Michael's

n iconic landmark in Macclesfield, St Michael's church has for centuries been an important part of the backdrop to the lives of the town's inhabitants who live and work within sight of it, or within earshot of its peal of twelve bells.

Tracing its foundation to 1278 or earlier, the main structure of St Michael's today is late Victorian, designed by Sir Arthur Blomfield, the architect who also designed the Bank of England and the Royal College of Music. There are two medieval chapels with fine tombs and notable stained glass. The building is graded 2* and is awarded three stars in Simon Jenkins' book "England's Thousand Best Churches". The church bears the marks of adaptation in every century since its endowment by Queen Eleanor of Castile.

Today, St Michael's church building plays many parts. It is the town's main Anglican place of worship and in addition to its regular Sunday services, weddings, baptisms and funerals, hosts civic services, the Town Carol Service and school services. It is a major venue for concerts and performances, public meetings on important matters of general interest and is a major tourist attraction on the edge of the Peak District.

We cannot take St Michael's church building for granted and the congregation are asking for your help to keep it open.

In the last ten years or so, the congregation of St Michael's has found over a million pounds for a major refurbishment of the building and maintenance projects.

Each year it costs over £50,000 to maintain and service the building. Major annual costs include insurance (£10,000), heating, lighting and water (£15,000) and repairs (£10,000). £250,000 is needed urgently to complete the roof repairs. The beautiful stained glass also need cleaning and refurbishment, costing around £15,000.

The congregation is finding it





increasingly difficult to support these costs which are additional to the costs of Christian ministry, such as clergy costs and salaries. All costs, with the exception of around £12,000 from lettings and the coffee shop, are met by the congregation. Finances are currently running at a deficit of £10,000 per annum - and the deficit is growing. Contrary to widespread belief we get no support from the Church of England centrally.

Friends of St Michael's are a community of people who help preserve this wonderful building for this and future generations in Macclesfield. Friends of St Michael's welcome individuals and families, community groups and schools, businesses, associations and professional bodies, who have an interest in making Macclesfield a great place to live, to visit or to work in. All funds from the Friends of St Michael's are devoted only to maintaining the fabric of this wonderful

building. Any donation is welcome of course, but we suggest that £30 per year might be a good guide for individuals / families - preferably via a standing order of £2.50 per month - less than 10 pence per day. If you can give more then please do so. Please gift aid any donations if you can.
