Entering the Season of Lent

'In Christ, God was reconciling the world to Himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us.' (2 Cor.5:19)

This Lent, in conjunction with other churches in Macclesfield, we will be using



as a focus for study together.

Based on Christopher Landau's book
'Loving Disagreement'
(but you don't need the book to take part)

Currently: Tuesday mornings at St John's/St Thomas' also: Thursday evenings at St Michael's

We're hoping for at least one other opportunity in the week too!

The other day I had a laugh-out-loud moment when someone enquired whether it was because of **them** that I had decided to do **The Unity Course** as a basis for study during Lent! It

Nor was it because I'd heard of a *fallout* between two other Christians I know!

Before I explain more, let me tell you about a lesson I learned, whilst a student at 'vicar-school'. I was on placement in a parish which had some really great ministry happening and new people were becoming Christians. It was a complete privilege to learn from Beverley, the vicar there.

What was definitely not good, however, were the pews there! They didn't have a full back, just an angled upper-back support ... at the WRONG ANGLE! The leading edge stuck sharply in my back and didn't actually support me at all. It was just plain painful!

But the lesson I most strongly learnt was just how often, when things seem to be going 'very well' in ministry (as they sometimes do!), there can often a backlash from 'the Enemy' – and so often this is manifested by Christians falling out with one another, over both big and, sadly, very small issues. It was from Bev that I learnt about the day-to-day reality of spiritual warfare.

During the season of Lent – the period leading up to Easter Day – many people think the focus should be on penance and discomfort, of 'going without' (of giving up chocolate, cakes, alcohol, meat, social media or whatever).

A much better view is to see Lent as a time simply to deepen one's relationship with God and to allow God to shape us in our Christ-likeness. If you like, the first group might see sitting on the uncomfortable pew as sufficient; whereas tackling growing in Christ has a longer and deeper effect (though may also be uncomfortable, albeit in a different, more purposeful way).

And so to **The Unity Course**, a 5-session, video-based course, written and presented by Revd Christopher Landau. This former BBC reporter had noted how readily Christians were to argue fiercely with one another about every conceivable issue. They didn't realise how damaging it was to the Church's unity and mission.

You and I are unlikely to find ourselves on national TV or radio, but how often do the words we use about other Christians, or the approach we take towards them, further affect our view of them? (Even as I say this, I wonder what image or aspect of Church life comes to mind for you? What is your 'battleline', however small or feint it might seem?)

And whatever it is, how does the way you act towards or speak about other Christians tarnish the view your family or circle of friends have of Christians, 'the Church' or of Jesus Himself?

Through **The Unity Course** we will seek to strengthen the quality of relationships among believers generally – both within St Michael's or between different churches.

I'm delighted there will be 3 courses (of 5 sessions each) happening during Lent in Macclesfield. Join the one that suits you best, or use the variety to catch up with any individual session (s) you miss:

Outline of the story of The Great Escaper

It was a story that captured the imagination of the world as Bernie embodied the defiant, "can-do" spirit of a generation that was fast disappearing. But of course, it wasn't the whole story. It was an inspirational but sanitised retelling of one man's need to come to terms with the lasting trauma of war.

Bernie's adventure, spanning a mere 48 hours, also marked the culmination of his 60-year marriage to Rene (Glenda Jackson). This film celebrates their enduring love but always with an eye to the lessons we might learn from this generation

Open Church Team

What do we do?

The Open Church Team oversees a number of activities falling within our "umbrella" of responsibility but we certainly do not actually DO them all ourselves. None of these would happen without the amazing team of volunteers who actually make these things happen. Thank you to everyone.



Our Remit

is to consider and oversee the ways that St Michael's uses its building and church grounds (churchyard), to offer generous and welcoming hospitality, allowing visitors to encounter God through our people and our building. Where appropriate, we will identify and use opportunities to introduce elements of the Christian faith to visitors, and invite further exploration.

There are many biblical references to hospitality, emphasising that this is how we demonstrate the nature of a hospitable God to those who do not know God. Leviticus 19:34 "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native -born. Love them as yourself, for you were

foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God". Recently we have considered 1 Peter 4:8-11. Above all, love each other deeply because love covers a multitude of sins. Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. (read the rest for yourselves)

Our Specific Areas of Responsibility are

- **Town Centre Ministry including Treacle Market**
- Café: A small group oversees development and running of the cafe, and links between the two offers.
- Use of Premises including Church grounds
- Access to Heritage
- Visitor Experience

What would we like to develop?

We would like to establish a Heritage Group, to lead on how we promote and describe our heritage building and artefacts, and how they can be used to inform and inspire – giving another (mediaeval) stained opportunity Encounter God.

Heritage Open Day is in September: could you take a lead or help with planning what we offer?

- We would like to ensure that we have someone available in the Welcome Area, at least one day per week: someone who can offer listening, prayer, or advice as well as information about the church building. We need someone to coordinate this. If not the coordinator, could you be a listener/pray-er?
- Produce a leaflet which explains some fundamentals of the Christian faith, to "match" the current tourist leaflets.

Crunching the Numbers

"The total Worshipping Community of the Church of England was

- 1,113,000 people in 2019;
- 1,031,000 people in 2020;
- 966,000 people in 2021;
- 984,000 people in 2022.

The Church of England's Worshipping Community in 2022 was 1.7% of the population of England".

Have you ever seen these figures in a news report and wondered where they come from?

Church of England Statistics

St Michael's Numbers

Every year we are asked to complete a "Statistics for Mission" return. These figures are combined to get the Diocesan return, then these become part of the national figure etc. So what did we report for St Michael's? (I have to admit that because of the size of our church community, and that we don't know everyone's date of birth, there is a certain amount of estimation involved....)

There are about 195 regular worshippers (who are not members of another church) of whom up to 28 are under 18, and about 80 are over 70 years of age. Of this total, 19 have joined and 13 left in 2023.

158 are on our electoral roll (that number is not an estimate but does include some who have now left) [are you on our roll, which is effectively our list of members? If not please do join forms are in the welcome area].

Average attendance on Sundays in 2023 was 83 adults and 14 children (under 16); the average for October was slightly higher at 98 adults and 16 children - so are we growing? We had to estimate the number who worship mainly online.

On "high days" numbers were higher: 149 at Easter; and 570 at Christmas (this number is very high because Christmas Eve was a Sunday and included the Crib Service). BUT in Advent, which included five school services and the Town Carol Service, total numbers were about 2500!

We had only 1 wedding in 2023, and 11 funerals, with another 19 in the crematorium. 11 children were baptised.

And how does all this relate to previous years? Not much change, taking Covid-19 into account.
